Daily Itinerary

Day One, Thursday
Arrive Tirana, Albania

Arriving in Tirana, check in to the hotel for overnight and to prepare for your upcoming adventures in Albania.

Dinner tonight is independent. Meals: Independent/en route – Hotel Opera or similar

Day Two, Friday

After breakfast, head out for a full-day tour of the capital of Albania.

Tirana is located 20 km from the Adriatic Sea on the Ishm River. Until it became the capital in the 1920s, Tirana was a small 17th century town with no more than 12,000 people



living here. Urbanization efforts began in the 1950s, and Nikita Khrushchev laid the first stone of the Palace of Culture in 1959. Since the collapse of Albania's communist government in the early 90s, many of the grim Soviet-type buildings have been repainted in bright colors, and new restaurants and cafés are springing up. The city is centered on **Skanderbeg Square**, named in honor of the national hero responsible for defeating the Ottomans.



Located on the eastern edge of Tirana, **Bunk'Art** is housed inside one of the capital city's most fascinating and unusual sites: a massive, five-story underground atomic shelter. Secretly built in the 1970s to accommodate late communist dictator Enver Hoxha and Albania's political and military elite in the event of a nuclear attack, the bunker was a sprawling maze of hallways and more than 100 fallout rooms, with living quarters and apartments, meeting rooms, and offices. More than two football fields in length, the presidential shelter is just one of some 750,000 bunkers built across Albania under Hoxha's orders.

In 2014, the Albanian government and a nonprofit arts group took over the presidential atomic shelter, transforming 24 of the 100 rooms into a contemporary arts and culture center called "Bunk'Art." There's also an Albanian history museum with rooms just as they were in the 1970s, including Enver Hoxha's office with his original furniture, desk, radio, phone, and maps. Special exhibits, photographs, and artifacts tell the story of Albania's dark communist past and history of repression.

Next, take the 2.6-mile **cable car** from the outskirts of Tirana up to **Dajti Mountain** for fabulous views of the city and the surrounding wooded national park. The 14-minute ride ascends to the "Balcony of Tirana," 3,445 feet above sea level.

Return to the city center to visit the **Et'hem Bey Mosque**. Construction on the mosque was begun in 1789 and finished by Et'hem Bey, the great-grandson of Suleiman Pasha Bargjini. Its frescoes depict rarely-allowed natural features such as waterfalls and trees.

This evening, visit an authentic Albanian village outside Tirana to meet with local villagers in their



private home. Learn firsthand about life in rural Albania with two generations who share their personal stories with you over a home-cooked dinner. There is no better way to learn about Albania's past and present.

Return to the city for overnight. Meals: B, D – Hotel Opera or similar

Day Three, Saturday Tirana • day trip to Kruja and Shkodra

Depart this morning for a day trip to the nearby towns of Kruja and Shkodra.

On the side of a hill at the foot of limestone peaks, the **citadel of Kruja** looks down on the town. From here, in 1450, the charismatic leader Skanderbeg

and his small hand-picked army defeated the Ottoman Sultan Murad II's army of 100,000. Visit the restored castle and citadel, with its Skanderbeg Museum and bazaar.

Withstanding numerous attacks from the Ottoman Turks, the **Kruja Fortress** marked the last stand before Albania fell to the conquering empire in 1478. Albania's rebel forces, led by Gjergj Kastriot Skanderbeg, withstood years of battle, and the castle now serves as both a historical landmark and a



symbol of the fierce national pride that Albanians feel. A **museum inside the castle** allows visitors to learn more about Skanderbeg, Albania's national hero.

A particular highlight of the fortress is the **Dollma Tekke**, a house of prayer for the Bektashi sect of Islam. A mystical sect with its roots in Sufism, the Bektashi order was prevalent in the Ottoman Empire and spread throughout Anatolia and the Balkans.

Next, take a tour of the fascinating **Ethnographic Museum**, in the large traditional home of an 18th century general. The house is filled with

period furnishings and implements, such as a built-in butter churn, a loom, a flour mill and wonderful rugs and embroidered fabrics.

Touring in Kruja ends as you browse the wooden stalls of the medieval **Turkish Bazaar**, a great place to shop for traditional handicrafts such as alabaster jewelry, silver filigree, hand-carved wooden items and hand-loomed carpets.





Continue on to **Shkodra**. Resting on the shores of Lake Skadar near the Adriatic Coast and the border with Montenegro, Shkodra's appeal comes from both its striking setting and its multifaceted history. Though most of its inhabitants are Muslim and Shkodra was once known as a center of Islamic scholarship, the city retains close ties to Italy through its Roman Catholic minority. A walk through town reveals Albanian patriotic statues, a clocktower built by an eccentric Englishman, several large mosques and a large citadel on the south side of the city that offers views out across the lake.

Rising above the city on a rounded hill, the **ruins of the fortress of Shkodra** mark where the city's history began, back in the Bronze Age. The remaining citadel dates mainly from the 15th century, but inside the structure you can find a part of the Illyrian's 350 BC "Cyclopean" wall, built of huge cleverly



stacked stones. 14th century St. Stephen's Church was updated in the 15th century by the Venetians. The panoramic views of Shkodra and its rivers from the fortress are breathtaking.

Pay a visit to the **Venice Art Mask Factory**, where exquisitely detailed Venetian masks are fashioned by renowned Albanian artist Edmond Angoni and his team of master artisans. Angoni studied the art of mask-making in Venice, and upon his return to Albania in 1996 opened this factory to showcase his creative original designs, each one crafted by hand using traditional techniques. Angoni's designs have been featured in theater and film productions all over the world, famously appearing in Stanley Kubrick's 1999 film, Eyes Wide Shut. Take a tour of the shop and learn more about the process behind making these imaginative pieces of art.

Return to Tirana this evening for overnight.

Day Four, Sunday
Tirana • Elbasan • Pogradec • Korce

Check out of the hotel this morning and depart for Korce, with en route stops for touring in Elbasan and Pogradec.

An important trade center in Roman times known as Mansio Scampa, **Elbasan** was situated near the point where the two routes of the Via Egnatia met. Destroyed by the Bulgars from the 6th to the 8th centuries and rebuilt by Sultan Mehmet in the 15th century, Elbasan received its new name, meaning "strong place" in Turkish. Admire the **ancient city walls** and **St. Mary's Orthodox Church**.

This afternoon, arrive in **Pogradec**, a town of about 30,000 on the shores of the deepest and oldest lake in the Balkans, Lake Ohrid. The town was declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1977. An ancient **Illyrian fortress** overlooks the town.

Continue on to **Korce**, a town situated on a plateau in southeastern Albania on the border with Greece. A culturally diverse place, Korce has been important for both Orthodox Christians and Muslims. The most important mosque in Albania, the Mirahori Mosque, is found here as well as the seat of an Orthodox metropolitan, or bishop.



Pay a visit to the **Museum of Medieval Art**, where thousands of icons saved from destruction are displayed along with paintings by Albanian masters.

This evening, check in to your hotel for overnight. Meals: B - Life Gallery Hotel or similar



Day Five, Monday Korce • Permet • Gjirokastra

Following breakfast at the hotel, set off toward Gjirokastra via Permet today. The small town of **Permet**, set along the Vjose River in southern Albania, serves as the capital of its district. Known for its roses and its tradition of folk music, Permet is also a local producer of wine and *raki*, a fiery distilled grape beverage. Its **Old Quarter** hosts a notable Orthodox church, Shen Nicolle.

Following touring in Permet, continue on to Gjirokastra. The **UNESCO-listed Old Town of Gjirokastra** is a well-preserved Ottoman town. Its castle and typical stone-roofed tower houses, called *kule*, make up an ensemble characteristic of the Balkan region.

The **13th century citadel** is one of the largest castles in the Balkans; the stunning views from its hilltop location bely its darker history as a prison for political dissidents in Communist times. Today it is home to the **Museum of Weapons** featuring captured artillery and memorabilia of the Communist resistance against German occupation, as well as a captured United States Air Force plane to commemorate the Communist regime's struggle against the "imperialist" western powers. (*Note, the visit to the Museum of Weapons will be done as schedules permit.*)

Check in to your hotel and enjoy an independent dinner this evening. Meals: B – Hotel Kalemi or similar

Day Six, Tuesday Gjirokastra • Saranda

Touring today begins with a visit to the **Ethnographic Museum**, which is situated on the site where Enver Hoxha, socialist dictator of Albania from 1944 to 1985, was born. Hoxha is responsible for the 750,000 concrete bunkers dotted across the country and intended as shelters in case of attack. A follower of Stalinist thought, Hoxha built prisons and labor camps as well, using his security forces to murder political opponents.



His original house burned in 1966 and another was built in its place in the typical Gjirokastra style. The museum's four floors are decorated with household items, folk costumes and artifacts that reflect the town's Ottoman heritage.

Following touring in Gjirokastra, depart for **Saranda**. This resort and port city, a favorite of Albanian honeymooners, is located on the Ionian Sea within sight of Corfu. Daily ferries ply the waters between the two places and there are nice shops in which to find Albanian handicrafts.

Located just east of Saranda on the road from Gjirokastra, stop by the **Blue Eye**, a



beautiful natural spring with clear blue waters descending to a depth of over 165 feet. It's a popular spot with locals who come here during the hot summer months for a cold – but refreshing – swim.

Visit the the UNESCO World Heritage Site of Butrint, which has been inhabited for millennia. Colonized in succession by Greece, Rome and Byzantium, the site still guards the remains of examples of all these eras. The 6th century BC fortifications, the 3rd century BC amphitheater, temples, public baths and houses, covered in mud and marsh vegetation, were preserved until excavations began in 1944. This is one of the last unspoiled historic areas in the Mediterranean region.

This evening, check in to the hotel for overnight.

Meals: B – Bougainville Bay Hotel, or similar



Day Seven, Wednesday Saranda • Apollonia • Berat

After breakfast, depart for Berat, stopping along the way to visit Porto Palermo, Llogara National Park, and Apollonia.

The first stop is the beautiful bay of Porto Palermo, which is guarded by the island **fortress of Ali Pasha**, built in the late 18th century by the notorious Albanian ruler. The dark and moody stone edifice is built in the Ottoman style, with walls 20 meters high.

Next, stop by the **Llogara National Park**. Established in 1966, the park encompasses parts of the Ceraunian Mountains along the Ionian coast in southwest Albania. Its 2,500 acres include forest, alpine meadows, rock-faced mountains, and seacoast — all within the diverse subtropical Mediterranean climate zone.

In a peaceful part of the Krygjata Valley along the Vjosa River stand the **ruins of the ancient town of Apollonia**, built as far back as 558 BC. Surrounded by a Roman wall near the Adriatic coast, Apollonia was mentioned by both Aristotle and Cicero, and in its day was known as an important center of trade. The beautifully preserved **13th century Byzantine church and monastery of Shen Meri (Saint Mary)**, rise from a low hill overlooking the ruins of a Roman bath, a small acropolis, a Roman library and the Odeon.

After touring the ruins of Apollonia, continue on to Berat. Upon arrival, check in to your hotel for overnight. Dinner tonight is included and will be at a local restaurant.

Meals: B, D - Mangalemi Hotel or similar



Day Eight, Thursday Berat • Durres • Tirana

This morning, meet your driver and guide to tour the wonders of Berat. This UNESCO-listed city sits on one of the oldest continuously inhabited sites in Albania, with settlements here since prehistoric times. One of the best-preserved medieval citadels in the Balkans -13th-century Berat Castle – is located directly above the old town, in the shadow of the Tomori Mountains. The dramatic architecture of Berat reflects both its Ottoman roots and its Albanian heritage; the whitewashed houses that sit above the Osumit River give the city its nickname, "Town of a Thousand Windows." On the



other side of the river, the Orthodox church of Shen Spyridon dominates the Gorica Quarter, historically a Slavic settlement.

Highlights of the town include the sprawling **Berat Castle** that once housed 20 churches and a mosque; **Onufri Museum** with its impressive collection of 16th-century icons and religious paintings as well as a massive 19th-century gilded iconostasis; **Bachelor's Mosque**, intended for the town's unmarried shop assistants and now listed as a Cultural Monument of Albania. The **National Ethnographic Museum** is located in an 18th-century Ottoman house, with rooms displaying home life using traditional Berat clothing, furnishings and tools; and the 1782 **Halveti Tekke prayer hall** is also listed as a Cultural Monument of Albania.




Dominating the Osum Valley, Berat's medieval stone fortress stands mostly unchanged today despite the region's numerous conflicts. It can only be approached by a broad, paved road up a steep hill, and the 200 families who live inside its thick walls still walk or ride donkeys up to their homes. In the center of the citadel, one of the old churches hosts a museum dedicated to the 16th century icon painter Onufri, who created a unique color of red that has not faded over the centuries. Scientists are still unable to discover his formula.



For our final stop in Berat, we sample the fine Albanian wines at **Cobo**Winery, reputedly the best winery in the country. The owner welcomes you and shows you around, explaining how they produce the wines according to family tradition. Visit the rolling vineyards, the traditional stone kulla house and winemaking facilities, and taste examples of some of the Cobo wines and raki, made from Albanian grapes.

Depart to return to Tirana, stopping along the way in Durres. As Albania's second largest city, Durres grew around an excellent natural harbor on the Adriatic across from important southern Italian ports. Founded around 600 BC by Illyrians, the harbor was coveted and fought over since its discovery. It has reportedly changed hands more than 33 times in the last 900 years. The Roman Empire conquered Durres in the 2nd century BC, and the city became the starting point of one of the most important Roman roads, the Via Egnatia to Constantinople. Visit the largest Roman amphitheater in the Balkans as well as the Roman **baths**, dating from the time of Emperor Hadrian.



Founded in 1951, the Durres **Archaeological Museum** displays a vast collection of ancient Greek, Roman and Byzantine artifacts, most of them discovered in the region. Of note is an abundance of small statues of Venus, showing that the area was a center of goddess worship.

Following touring in Durres, set off for Tirana for our final night in Albania.

Upon arrival check in to the hotel and enjoy a free evening to rest or explore independently. Meals: B - Hotel Opera or similar

Day Nine, Friday

Depart Tirana

The journey ends this morning with a transfer to the airport for departure. Meals: B

Important Notes: Is This Trip Right For You?

While the accommodations are designed to be comfortable for travel in this part of the world, they will vary from small, moderate three star to four star hotels, some quite small with basic amenities and services. (Please see **Hotel Upgrade** pricing section above if interested in upgrading hotels.) It is



important to keep in mind that Albania may not be up to the standards North American travelers expect. Services are improving in the region; nevertheless you may encounter problems with plumbing, bureaucratic service, road conditions, unpaved sidewalks, uneven surfaces and steps and availability and quality of public restrooms. Some areas, relatively speaking, have seen few travelers, and the infrastructure is not yet fully developed.

While this program is designed to be the most comfortable possible for travel in this region, this is an adventuresome trip. It is rated as *rigorous touring* due to the daily walking involved, some long driving days, the conditions of some roads, and the overall shortcomings of the tourism infrastructure. This itinerary features a significant amount of touring on foot. Many streets are of cobblestone, and some attractions are only accessible via steep staircases. Museums rarely have elevators. In the hotels, you may find that showers/baths have steep steps up or ledges, which can become slippery and require extra caution. Handrails will not usually be present indoors or outdoors, and care and caution are required to avoid a fall. Flexibility and a sense of humor are essential components of the enjoyment of your trip.

Every effort has been made to ensure that the information in this schedule is accurate. However, trip itineraries are always subject to change. We do our best to inform you in advance of any changes, but due to the nature of travel in Albania, this may not always be possible.

Weather

Albania enjoys a transitional maritime/continental climate, with warm summers and fairly mild winters. Spring and summer are the best times to travel here, particularly when driving overland. In May and June, temperatures throughout typically range from lows in the mid 50s to highs in the mid- to upper 70s. In July and August highs generally get into the 80s and above, with September and October bringing cooler temperatures again, and the possibility of more rain.

Please remember, weather at all times of year has an element of the unpredictable. This information comes from weatherbase.com and is based on data from previous temperatures on record. It is always advisable to check with weatherbase.com closer to your departure date for current conditions and forecasts for the specific region you will be visiting.
