On this journey through the Kyrgyz outback, spend a night with a village family, visit with an eagle hunter and admire dramatic sandstone formations. Begin in Kyrgyzstan's capital, Bishkek, visiting Osh Bazaar and the Statue of Manas, Kyrgyzstan's mythical hero, before driving to out-of-the-way Kochkar to overnight with a Kyrgyz family. Visit high-altitude Lake Issyk-Kul and spend the night at a guesthouse in the traditional village of Chon-Kemin, getting to know the locals before returning to the capital to hear a portion of Epic of Manas recounted by a master.

Daily Itinerary

Day One, Friday Arrive Bishkek, Kyrgyzstan

Upon arrival in Bishkek, you are met and transferred to the hotel. The afternoon and evening are free to rest, with an independent dinner at the hotel. **Note:** Common arrival times into Bishkek are early a.m., in which case the hotel is included if you arrive early a.m. of Day 2. Touring on Day 2 will begin around 9:00 a.m. Meals: Independent – Plaza Hotel or similar

Day Two, Saturday

Rishkek

The capital of Kyrgyzstan, **Bishkek** was founded as the Russian garrison of Pishpek. The city is set before a backdrop of the northern edge of the Ala-Too mountain range, and was originally a heavily forested rest stop on the Silk Road. Appropriated by the Russians in 1877, the city was eventually renamed Bishkek

when Kyrgyzstan achieved its independence at the break-up of the Soviet Union. Two rivers, the Alamedin and Ala-Archa, run from the mountains through the city into the Chuy River, which also forms the Kazakh border. Bishkek is graced with large boulevards, friendly people and more trees than any other Central Asian city. On clear days, the permanently snow-capped mountains looming over the city provide spectacular views.

The sights, smells and sounds of bazaars are part of the sensory experience of Bishkek, and there are several within the city; the largest is **Osh Bazaar**. Travelers can purchase local crafts, dried fruit,



fermented milk, rice, grains, and of course the brightly colored Kyrgyz textiles by haggling with the traders in these markets.



Bishkek's **central square**, **Ala-Too**, was laid out in 1984 and adorned with a giant statue of Lenin. In 2003, Lenin was replaced by a new statue, called Freedom. This is where the public gathers to celebrate – or to demonstrate.

Near Biskek's main square, Ala-Too, the **Ethnographic Museum** takes you on a walk through the Kyrgyz people's history and traditions. Admire everyday tools, clothing and artifacts from long ago, with displays of costumes, carpets, tableware, equestrian gear, icons and jewelry.

Dinner tonight is independent before overnight at the hotel. Meals: B – Plaza Hotel or similar

Day Three, Sunday
Bishkek • Kochkor

Depart Bishkek this morning after breakfast at the hotel, heading for Kochkor. The sprawling village of **Kochkor** is located in the flat plain of a cup-shaped valley shortly off the beaten path between Bishkek and Naryn. Formerly named after the Russian Czarist Prime Minister Stolypin (or, according to local legend, after a particularly tenacious fighting sheep), the town has lost its former German population and today is largely home to working-class Kyrgyz. A visit to the local vegetable market will testify to Kochkor's reputation as an agricultural center.

The **Kochkor Regional Museum** is worth seeing primarily for its exhibitions on local and traditional Kyrgyz crafts. The museum also contains tributes to local celebrities and a comically large stuffed sheep.



Observe **traditional felt-making**, a craft that has survived the centuries. The Kyrgyz people have always used felted wool to cover their yurts and make rugs, bags, slippers and hats. To make an *ala-kyiz* rug, a second layer of felt of one or more colors is pressed into the original piece, creating a rug with a fuzzy pattern. A *shyrdak* is made with the appliqué method, and results in a crisper design.

Meet a **Kyrgyz felt-making family** and **take your meals with them today**, experiencing daily life with a rural family. Overnight in a privately-run guesthouse tonight. Meals: B, L, D – *Homestay*

Day Four, Monday
Kochkor • Jety Oguz • Karakol

Say goodbye to your host family this morning after breakfast, and set off along the southern shore of Lake Issyk-Kul for Karakol.



The village of Bokonbaevo on the less-populated southern shore of Lake Issyk-kul was once a flourishing place named after a Kyrgyz poet. Today it is a refuge for Kyrgyz people who strive to keep alive their traditions of herding, crafts, and hunting with eagles. Steppe nomads have used birds of prey for hunting for thousands of years. The birds' keen eyesight and ability to survey the grasslands from far above give them an advantage that humans were able to harness to their own ends. Observe a **demonstration of the eagles** that Bokonbaevo's eagle hunters (berkutchi) have trained to hunt for them.

Admire the vivid colors and fantastic shapes of the rock formations as you walk through **Fairytale Valley,** a dry, sandy valley punctuated with gullies, sharp outcroppings, striated cliffs and castle-like promontories. Have **lunch here at a yurt camp** before continuing on.

The next stop is **Jety Oguz Canyon** with its red sandstone cliffs, located 25km outside of **Karakol.** On the way, pause at red Broken Heart Hill, where two suitors are fabled to have killed each other in a struggle for a beautiful woman, who then died of a broken heart herself. Farther on, the massive Red Wall of the Seven Bulls soars upwards. A light hike leads to the **Dolina Tsvetov**, or "Valley of **Flowers**," aptly named for the masses of wildflowers that bloom in the spring. Visit a **yurt settlement** for fermented mare's milk, *koumiss*, and enjoy an **optional horseback ride**.



Arrive this evening at the eastern tip of **Lake Issyk-Kul**. Here, the **city of Karakol** was founded late in the 19th century as a Russian military outpost, and grew as a refuge for Chinese Muslims fleeing persecution in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Many buildings here are constructed in a Chinese style from wood without the use of metal nails. Arrive tonight and check into the hotel for overnight. Meals: B, L – Hotel Amir, Green Yard Guesthouse or similar



Day Five, Tuesday





Enjoy some touring this morning in Karakol. First visit the Przewalski Museum. The Przewalski Museum tells the story of Nikolai Mikhaylovich Przewalski, a 19th century Russian explorer who mapped much of Central Asia and China. He noted species of plants and animals that were previously unknown to the Russians, and consequently had a breed of horse and a breed of gazelle named after him. He died in Karakol, whose name became Przewalsk, or Przhevalsk, in his honor until Kyrgyzstan's independence in 1991.

Next visit the Holy Trinity Orthodox Church. This 19th century Russian Orthodox church was – like the rest of the town – constructed of wood without any metal nails, making its size all the more impressive. Though it fell into disuse during the Soviet period, the church is now active again, and its green and gold roof is a recognizable landmark in Karakol.

Continue to the **Dungan Mosque**. The sky-blue wooden minaret of the Dungan Mosque in the center of Karakol is one of the most recognizable features of the city. The mosque resembles a pagoda more than an Islamic house of worship because the Dungan – Muslim Chinese who fled China in the 1880s – retained much of their old country's aesthetic style when they arrived in Kyrgyzstan. The wood is intricately carved with floral motifs, and the presence of Cyrillic alongside Arabic words in the mosque is a testament to the multicultural heritage of the inhabitants of Kyrgyzstan.

Visit the One Village One Product Association, opened in 2011 to provide an opportunity for Kyrgyz women to produce high-quality crafts and food products. Take a tour of the office and studio space, and observe as local women demonstrate how they create traditional handmade crafts, in particular felt goods such as slippers, wallets, bags, and toys, all created with locally produced wool and natural dyes.

Dinner tonight will be at the home of a local family, and overnight at the hotel. Meals: B, D - Hotel Amir, Green Yard Guesthouse or similar

> Day Six, Wednesday Karakol • Chon-Kemin

Depart for Chon-Kemin with stops en route in Cholpan-Ata. Cholpan-Ata is one of several places in the Kyrgyz Chu Valley where you can see **petroglyphs** thought to have been created by the tribes of the Neolithic period. The images are mainly primitive long-horned ibex, horses, camels and snow leopards. There are several thousand petroglyphs here providing a glimpse into the world of the Iron Age, as well as a small museum.



Located directly on the water, the **Rukh Ordo Museum and Cultural Center** features five small chapels dedicated to each of the five spiritual beliefs that have been important in Kyrgyzstan. The Russian Orthodox (including an icon presented by Boris Yeltsin), Buddhist, Muslim, Jewish and Catholic faiths are represented here.

Continue on to Chon-Kemin tonight, arriving in mid-afternoon or early evening for dinner and overnight at the guesthouse.

Meals: B, D – Kalmak Ashu Guesthouse or similar



Day Seven, Thursday
Chon-Kemin • Bishkek

The beautiful, steep-sided **Chon-Kemin Valley** runs parallel to the border of Kazakhstan between two mountain ranges. The valley's population is mostly Kyrgyz of the Sary Bagysh tribe, and many traditions are still practiced here.

Attend a demonstration of Kyrgyz **horse games**, such as *ulak tartysh*, a type of polo played with a goat carcass, and *kurosh*, which is wrestling on horseback.

Head back to Bishkek, stopping en route at the **Burana Tower**. Built in the 11th century, it is one of the only existing watch towers on the ancient Silk Road that traversed Kyrgyzstan. It is possible to climb up to the platform from inside the tower — while the steps are steep, the view from the top is rewarding. The area was historically a settlement called Balasagun, the birthplace of the poet Jusup Balasagun, whose surviving work consists of a long epic poem called "Kutadgy Bilig" or "the knowledge which brings happiness." The settlement was an important seat of power and was so celebrated that Genghis Khan's Mongol horde spared the city from destruction when it began to conquer the region in the early 13th century. The Mongols renamed the city Gobalik, meaning "good city." Visit the small museum and the collection of ancient bal-bals, carved stone figures used as monuments.

Return to the capital in the afternoon and rest up before a special dinner and folklore show with a **performance of the UNESCO-listed national poem, "Epic of Manas.**" The Kyrgyz mythical hero,



Manas, fought against the Uighur people in the ninth century. His *Epic of Manas* story is a Kyrgyz epic poem with nearly a half-million verses. Never written down until the 19th century, the poem has been passed down by word of mouth for centuries. A performance of selections from the beloved poem is often given at Kyrgyz festivals, accompanied on the *komuz*, a traditional three-stringed instrument.

Overnight at the hotel after dinner. Meals: B, D – Plaza Hotel or similar

Day Eight, Friday

Depart Bishkek

The trip concludes with transfers to the airport.

Important Notes: Is This Trip Right For You?

The accommodations vary from superior tourist class to more basic guesthouses and a homestay, with shared outdoor facilities. It is important to keep in mind that the country of Kyrgyzstan may not be up to the standards North American travelers expect. Services are improving; however, you may encounter problems with bureaucratic service, road conditions, plumbing, unpaved sidewalks, uneven surfaces and steps, variety of locally available foods, and availability and quality of public restrooms. You are traveling in some areas that see few travelers, and the infrastructure is not yet fully developed.

While this program is designed to be the most comfortable possible for travel in this region, it is rated as **rigorous touring** due to the daily walking involved, the length of some overland rides and the overall shortcomings of the tourism infrastructure. This itinerary features a significant amount of touring on foot. Many streets are of packed dirt, and some attractions are only accessible via steep staircases with tall, uneven steps.

Every effort has been made to make the information in this schedule accurate. However, trip itineraries are always subject to change. We do our best to inform you in advance of any changes, but due to the nature of travel in Kyrgyzstan, this may not always be possible. Only those willing to accept these conditions should consider joining this program.



To reap the full rewards of this adventure, travelers must be able to walk at least a mile a day. Flexibility, a sense of humor and a willingness to accept local standards of amenities and services are essential components to the enjoyment of this trip.

Weather

Kyrgyzstan has a dry continental climate. The weather is usually clear except for early spring, and average annual precipitation is low. The spring months of April and May and fall months of September and October are the best time to visit, when the average daytime temperatures in the capital, Bishkek, range from the low 60s to the 70s. Temperatures do fall at nighttime and the average ranges from the low 40s to the 50s during the spring and fall. The summer months of June, July and August are warmer on average and can range from the 60s at night to the upper 80s during the day.

Kyrgyzstan's mountainous terrain encompasses tall peaks, glaciers, high-altitude lakes and mountains that cool the heat of a Central Asian summer. Winter temperatures are more extreme, with lows dropping below freezing. There can be a wide disparity between temperatures at elevation in the mountains and lower-altitude temperatures in the valleys.

Please remember, weather at all times of year has an element of the unpredictable. This information comes from weatherbase.com and is based on data from previous temperatures on record. It is always advisable to check with weatherbase.com closer to your departure date for current conditions and forecasts for the specific region of Kyrgyzstan you will be visiting.

International Airfare

MIR's in-house, full-service air department is available to assist with your air travel needs. Check with MIR before booking air on your own, as we are happy to research and compare the best fares available through multiple channels. Airfare varies depending on a wide variety of factors, such as dates of travel and seasonality, seat availability, special airline promotions, how restrictive ticket changes are, how long the fares can be held without purchase, routing considerations such as stopovers and more. Tour dates are based on the land tour only. Our preferred carrier for this tour is Turkish Airlines, as they offer convenient itineraries and competitive rates from multiple cities across the U.S. to Kyrgyzstan.

Visas

No Kyrgyz visa is required for U.S. passport holders visiting Kyrgyzstan. However, you may need a visa for any country you fly through prior to joining the tour, such as Turkey. Non-U.S. passport holders may require a Kyrgyz visa. Please contact MIR for further information.

Essential Central Asia, Uzbekistan and Turkmenistan, 13 days. Explore the markets, mosques and minarets of oasis towns on the fringes of the Kyzyl Kum and Kara Kum deserts. Here, spiritual beliefs were the greatest commodities to flow along trade routes, and civilizations blossomed amidst austere natural beauty.

Essential Tajikistan, 8 days. Rarely-visited Tajikistan is wreathed in spectacular mountains and colored with the influence of Persia, the Islamic world and Russia. Essential Kazakhstan, 7 days. Begin in the new city of Astana, capital of Kazakhstan only since 1997. Fly to Chimkent and discover the historic city of Turkistan with its UNESCO-listed mausoleum of a revered Sufi sheikh. Fly to Almaty and explore spectacular Charyn Canyon, with its strange rock formations and colorful strata.

Essential Uzbekistan, 10 days. Beginning in the modern capital, Tashkent, roam the great Silk Road oases of Bukhara, Samarkand and Khiva, all of them UNESCO Sites. Admire their mosques, *madrassahs* and minarets clad in ceramic tiles the color of the desert sky.
