## Day One, Saturday

Arrive Warsaw, Poland

Arrive in **Warsaw** and following immigration and customs formalities, transfer to the hotel. The afternoon and evening are free to rest and refresh. Meet with your guide to get acquainted and discuss the touring program.

Founded in 1374, Warsaw became Poland's capital in 1596, when King Zygmunt III moved here from Krakow. For the next 200 years, Warsaw was beset on all sides by the Swedes, the Prussians, and the Russians. The late 18th century was Warsaw's "Golden Age" under King Stanislaw August Poniatowski, Poland's last king. Since then, except for a brief period between the two World Wars, Poland was not truly independent until 1991, when the Soviet Union dissolved.

By the end of WWII, nearly 85% of Warsaw was reduced to rubble. The city has been rebuilt since then, including a painstaking recreation of the historic Old Town. Meals: Independent – *Polonia Palace or similar* 



Day Two, Sunday

#### Warsaw

This morning, set off on an exploration of Warsaw. Begin on foot with a tour of the **Old Town and Market Square**. Admire the facade of the powerful **Royal Castle**, home of Poland's kings from the 16th century up to Poland's partition; the Market Square, a beautiful pedestrian area filled with cafés, market stalls, and strolling townspeople; and Warsaw's neoclassical **Grand Theater**. The entire Old Town was meticulously reconstructed after its destruction at the hands of the Nazis after the Warsaw Uprising, and is now a **UNESCO World Heritage Site**.

Visit the Heroes of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising Monument. This is the beginning



of "Memory Lane," a trail of black marble stones commemorating some of the events and the people of the uprising. Follow the trail to **Mila 18**, the headquarters of the uprising, led by Mordechai Anielewicz. A pile of rubble is all that remains.

After an independent lunch, visit **Lazienki Park** along the banks of the Vistula River, a favorite place among citizens and tourists alike. This romantic park was landscaped in 1764 as part of the king's residence. It features several palaces and pavilions, a temple, historic monuments, an amphitheater, and two orangeries. The Palace on the Water within the park is a monument of Polish history, with its splendid interior providing a lovely setting for cultural events, art exhibitions, and official state ceremonies. Visitors arriving between May and September proceed to the dramatic **Chopin monument**, surrounded by blooming roses. Benches are scattered throughout the greenery, and a piano sits on the dais next to the windswept sculpture of Chopin, who seems to be looking over his shoulder at the pianist. Internationally acclaimed pianists perform romantic Chopin pieces as the trees behind the monument rustle and sway.

Dinner is independent and the remainder of the evening is free to explore the city center. Meals: B – Polonia Palace or similar

Day Three, Monday

Warsaw • day train to Krakow

Following breakfast at the hotel, transfer to the central station and catch a day train to Krakow. Enjoy views of the Polish countryside dotted with small private farms and fields.

Arrive in Krakow around midday and check into the hotel. Following some free time for an independent lunch, begin exploring Krakow with a guided **walking tour of this beautiful city.** 

Poland's royal capital from the 11th to the 16th century, Krakow was included on UNESCO's first

World Heritage list in 1978. Since the Tatar raids in the 13th century, the Old Town has remained mostly intact, the only large Polish city to escape the destruction of WWII. In its center is the largest remaining medieval town square in Europe, Rynek Glowny, the Main Market Square, laid out in 1257.

The **Main Market Square** is one of the finest urban designs of its kind. Its buildings have changed over the years, and today most of them look neoclassical, but the basic structures are older, as can be seen by their doorways, architectural details, and interiors.

Not far from the Main Market Square is the **Florian Gate**, the only one of the seven original gates left standing from the nearly two miles of walls that



used to surround the Old Town. Just outside the gate is the **Barbican**, a squat and powerful brick



bastion that was originally connected to the gate by a drawbridge and walled passage. Its walls are nine feet thick. In the same corner of the square is the **Basilica of St Mary's** from whose tower the *hejnal* is sounded hourly. This bugle call was used to signal the raising and lowering of the great gate, and to warn the townspeople of attack. The familiar refrain is cut off in mid-phrase, in remembrance of a bugler who, legend tells us, was shot in the throat by a Tatar arrow as he was blowing the *hejnal*.

Independent dinner, and overnight at the hotel. Meals: B – Queen Boutique Hotel or similar

# Day Four, Tuesday

#### Krakow • half day trip to Auschwitz/Birkenau

This morning, continue exploring Krakow on foot with a visit to **Wawel Castle**. Wawel Castle on the hill above the Old Town was the seat of Polish kings for hundreds of years. The high ground of Wawel Hill has been occupied since the Paleolithic Age. The Polish kings didn't take up residence until the 11th century. In the 16th century, King Sigismund the Old had the castle complex designed and built into the Renaissance ensemble that it is today.

Gothic **Wawel Cathedral**, with its thousand years of history, has since the 14th century been the place where Polish kings were crowned at the beginning of their reigns, and buried at the end of them. Chapels and crypts have been added on over the years, nearly hiding the central nave. This is where Polish Pope John Paul II celebrated his first Mass as a priest.

Also visit the *Collegium Maius* of **Jagiellonian University**. The *Collegium Maius* is the university's original building, and now a museum. Items on display at the museum include a collection of "scientific objects



and curios" that was begun in the 15th century, permanent exhibitions of painting and sculpture, and treasures specific to the university, such as Nicolaus Copernicus' original tuition receipt from when he was a student here.

There is time for an independent lunch before a visit out of town to the **UNESCO site of Auschwitz**, located about an hour outside of Krakow. The Polish town of Oswiecim, whose German name is Auschwitz, has become a symbol of horror and genocide. In 1940, the German occupiers took over this former army barracks and

populated it with Polish political prisoners. As the war years went on, the Nazis expanded and refined the camp, imprisoning Jews from all over Europe here before sending them on to their deaths at nearby Birkenau. The **Martyrdom Museum at Auschwitz** is a ghastly reminder of the inhumanity of which



humans are capable. Join a group tour here, with up to 30 travelers and an expert guide. Earpieces are used to ensure you can hear the guide.

Return to Krakow this evening with the remainder of the day spent independently – to reflect, rest, and explore. Dinner this evening is independent. Meals: B – Queen Boutique Hotel or similar

# Day Five, Wednesday

#### Krakow • half day trip to Wieliczka Salt Mine

This morning, head for the outskirts of the city again for a visit to the **Wieliczka Salt Mine**, where miners have worked more than 700 years. In the 19th and early 20th centuries, miners and sculptors

carved out beautiful chambers and chapels on the first three levels. A highlight of the trip down the mines is the fabulous Chapel of the Blessed Kinga, where everything, including statuary and chandeliers, is carved from salt. A **UNESCO World Heritage Site**, the mine displays 700 years of evolving technology and artistry. <u>The</u> touring here will be with other travelers, up to a group size of 35 with each traveler having his own ear piece.



Return to the city center for free time to explore independently. Head to Cloth Hall in the main market square to shop for all kinds of Polish souvenirs. Lunch and dinner are independent, and overnight is at the hotel.

Day Six, Thursday

**Depart Krakow** 

After breakfast, the program ends with a departure transfer from the hotel to the airport. Meals: B

Flexible Essential Trips feature most of the inclusions of our escorted small group tours with just a few exceptions: tours are led by local MIR guides, without an additional tour manager; fewer meals are pre-planned, so you can eat where and when you want; and baggage handling and gratuities are left to your discretion.

#### **Important Notes: Is This Trip Right For You?**

It is important to keep in mind that while Poland is fairly modern and cosmopolitan, some aspects may not live up to the standards North American travelers expect. Services are improving in the region; nevertheless, you may encounter problems with plumbing, bureaucratic service, road conditions, unpaved sidewalks, uneven surfaces and steps and availability of public restrooms.

While this program is designed to be comfortable for travel in this region, this is an adventuresome tour. It is rated as *rigorous touring* due to the daily walking involved the general challenges of traveling internationally in unfamiliar environments. This itinerary features a significant amount of touring on foot. Some streets are of cobblestone, and some attractions are only accessible via steep staircases. Museums rarely have elevators. *Please note*:Wieliczka Salt Mine is accessed by a 10-story descent by stairs only. (Elevator access for the descent may be possible at additional cost, but cannot be guaranteed due to the logistics in the mine). Expect crowded conditions and a long climb down. The elevator is used for the ascent at the end of the tour. Touring at Auschwitz/Birkenau and at Wieliczka Salt Mine is done with a mixed public group of other travelers, with expert site guide and personal ear piece, rather than as a private excursion.

Every effort has been made to ensure that the information in this schedule is accurate. However, trip itineraries are always subject to change. We do our best to inform you in advance of any changes, but due to the nature of travel in Central Europe, this may not always be possible.

#### Weather

This part of Europe has a travel season of roughly May to September. Spring and summer are the best times to travel to Poland. Travelers should expect temperatures in May to range from 50-65 degrees Fahrenheit, and in June and July 55-75 degrees Fahrenheit. Rain and slightly cooler temperatures at night are possible.

**Please remember, weather at all times of year has an element of the unpredictable.** This information comes from <u>weatherbase.com</u> and is based on data from previous temperatures on record.



It is always advisable to check with <u>weatherbase.com</u> closer to your departure date for current conditions and forecasts for the specific region you will be visiting.

#### **International Airfare**
