Rarely visited Tajikistan is wreathed in spectacular mountains and colored with the influence of Persia, the Islamic world, and Russia. Beginning in the country's capital, Dushanbe, follow traces of Alexander the Great to alpine Iskanderkul Lake, ringed by craggy mountain peaks. Explore the ruins of the ancient city of Penjikent, and share a meal in a hospitable Tajik home. Visit historic Khujand in the fertile Fergana Valley, and rub shoulders with everyday local people at the lively markets and teahouses before flying back to the capital and home.

Daily Itinerary

Day One, Thursday

Arrive Dushanbe, Tajikistan

Upon arrival in Dushanbe, you’ll be met and transferred to the hotel. Sleep in to rest up from a likely early morning arrival, and begin touring today at lunchtime.



Named for the Persian word for Monday, **Dushanbe** was at one point a small market village where traders would gather each Monday to sell their goods. During the Soviet era, the city grew to be the most important industrial center in Tajikistan, but the Barakat Covered Market reflects Dushanbe’s historical ties to local trade. As Tajikistan’s capital, the city is home to various national museums, but watching the colorfully dressed locals stroll by from a park or café is a highlight in and of itself.

Start with a welcome lunch and a chance to discuss the program with your guide, and then begin touring. It is hard to miss the golden arch and bubbling fountains of the **Ismail Samani monument** in the center of town. Commemorating the 1,100th anniversary of the Samanid State, the handsome monument honors the Persian Samanis, whose time in power was one of peace and plenty, with a great flourishing of science and the arts.

Located in the very center of Dushanbe, **Rudaki Park** is dedicated to the 9th century Persian poet Rudaki. Paths wind through the flowers and grass, and a mosaic-covered statue of Rudaki and a fountain stand in its center. Families from all over Dushanbe flock here on warm evenings and holidays.

Touring today also includes the **Gurminj Museum of Musical Instruments**. Badakhshani actor Gurminj Zavkybekov began this small but fascinating museum.



Displaying a fine collection of beautifully crafted antique and modern instruments from Afghanistan, the Pamirs, Turkey, and China, the museum is often the scene of exuberant performances and demonstrations.

Finally visit Dushanbe's **Shohmansur Bazaar**, selling local produce, bread, prepared food and clothes, shoes, and carpets, before an independent dinner and overnight at the hotel.

Day Two, Friday

Dushanbe

After breakfast, take a drive a short way out of town. Just 18 miles from Tajikistan's capital in a valley surrounded by snow-capped mountains, the city of Hissar is dominated by the 18th century **Hissar Fortress**. The area has been inhabited since antiquity and features an 8th century mosque, but it was the emirs who inhabited the fortress and the Silk Route traders that crossed the valley who made Hissar a center of commerce and learning. Several *madrassahs*, or Islamic religious schools, that date from the emir period are still standing today.

The Hissar Fortress houses the remains of the palace of the Bukhara Emirate Beks. Its thick, baked brick walls once guarded a pool, garden, and palace, and sat opposite a noisy market and caravanserai. The strategically important fortress guarded the town, which was a staging post on the old Silk Road, and it is said that it was overcome and destroyed by the likes of Cyrus the Great and Alexander the Great. What remains today is a portion of the wall and two monumental gate towers from the 18th century.

After lunch, return to the city, where touring includes the **National Museum of Tajikistan**, which opened to the public in 2013. This large, modern building is filled with exhibits on Tajikistan's natural and political history. An airy, light-filled space stretching from the ground floor to the glass ceiling four stories up forms the heart of the museum. The structure is capped by an enormous model of Tajikistan's national seal.

Meals: B, L – *Serena Hotel or similar*

Day Three, Saturday

Dushanbe • Iskanderkul Lake

Depart Dushanbe this morning after breakfast at the hotel, heading for Iskanderkul via Varzob Gorge and Anzob Pass. The powerful Varzob River plunges through the Fan Mountains on its way to Dushanbe, forming the rugged Varzob Gorge, where the Gusgarf Waterfall cascades over the rocks in a spectacular outpouring.

Drive over steep Anzob Pass, following the Varzob River down the south slope of the Hissar Range.

Arrive this afternoon at the lake. Beautiful, turquoise **Iskanderkul**, or Lake Alexander, is a high-altitude lake ringed by craggy mountain peaks, and was formed when debris from a landslide dammed the outlet of the Iskander River.

Meals: B, L, D – *Tourist Bungalow or similar*

Driving time today will total about 4 hours, covering a distance of 150 km (93 mi).



Day Four, Sunday
Iskanderkul Lake • Penjikent


Depart this morning after breakfast, with arrival mid-day in Penjikent, an isolated city of 35,000 that is most famous for its past. On a ledge above the new town are the ruins of what was an important Sogdian trade center. Called Bunjikath, meaning “five villages,” the town was built in the 5th century AD, and survived for 300 years until the Arabs burned it during their 8th century invasion.

Visit the site of the **archaeological dig at Old Penjikent**, where excavations began 50 years ago. Discovered in 1933, the early medieval site includes the remains of the *shakhristan*, or town center, and the frescoed foundations of the houses of wealthy merchants. Two Zoroastrian temples demonstrate the importance of the old city.

Visit the newly renovated **Rudaki Museum**, filled with Sogdian artifacts and natural exhibits from the area. The Samanid court poet Abdullah Mohammed Rudaki, born in Penjikent, is considered the father of Persian poetry. Frescoes from the archaeological site, statues, ossuaries, and costumes complete the exhibits.

Meals: B, L, D – *Maksud Guesthouse or similar*

Driving time today will total about 5 hours, covering a distance of 270 km (167 mi).



Day Five, Monday
Penjikent • Istaravshan

Depart overland, driving up and over the **Shahriston Pass** heading for Istaravshan. Founded in the 6th century BC by Cyrus the Great, **Istaravshan** celebrated its 2,500th anniversary in 2002. Known from the 14th century Timurids as Ura-Tube, the old part of the city retains its traditional layout from this time. The artisans of Ura-Tube were highly regarded in Central Asia, and their products, including fabrics, knives, and embroidery, were sought after.

Istaravshan is renowned throughout Tajikistan for its **high-quality knives**. Local blacksmiths produce these functional pieces of art using metal, animal horn, bone, and sometimes walnut wood. They are often on sale at the main entrance to the bazaar. The workshops near the market can also be visited on some days.

Stop at **Mugh Teppa** Fortress. Only the gate and two columns survive of the citadel on top of Mugh Hill, said to be from the time of Cyrus the Great. (**Note:** This visit may be moved to Day 6.)

The 16th century **mosque and madrassah of Kuk Gumbaz** (meaning “light blue dome”) were built by the son of the astronomer-king Ulug Bek, who built some of Samarkand’s monuments. The beautifully painted and tiled structure is in the western part of the city. This is a working *madrassah*, so travelers can see and perhaps converse with young students studying Islam here.

Meals: B, L, D – *Sadbarg Hotel or similar*

Driving time today will total about 6 hours, covering a distance of 290 km (180 mi).





Day Six, Tuesday Istaravshan • Khujand

Continue to the scenic gateway to the Fergana Valley, Khujand. Stop en route at Mugh Teppa Fortress, if it wasn't visited yesterday.

Arrive in Khujand mid-morning and check into the hotel before setting out to explore the town. Situated at the entrance to the Fergana Valley on the Syr Darya River, **Khujand** is the second-largest city in Tajikistan. Its origins have been attributed to both Alexander the Great (in 329 BC) and Cyrus the Great of Persia (several centuries earlier); whichever is true, the city is an ancient one. A former religious center and a Silk Road center, Khujand is home to several medieval monuments.

Start with a visit to the Muslihiddin complex. Twelfth century leader and poet Muslihiddin Khujandi is buried here in the **Muslihiddin Memorial Complex**, which has been rebuilt many times since those days. Today, the complex includes a 16th century mosque and 19th century minaret, as well as the poet's mausoleum.

Khujand's **pink-painted covered Panjshanbe bazaar** is overflowing with goods to buy. The huge, columned structure shelters orderly rows of tables covered with bags

of brilliant spices and nuts, straw-bedded melons with macramé handles, hanging haunches of meat, and piles of vegetables.

Lunch will be at a local restaurant before you enter the new **Historical Museum of Sughd** through a reconstructed medieval city gate. Displays include ancient Sogdian artifacts and exhibits from more recent Tajik history. If time permits, visit the **Arbob Palace** as well.

Meals: B, L, D – *Khujand Grand Hotel or similar*

Driving time today will total about 2 hours, covering a distance of 90 km (56 mi).

Day Seven, Wednesday Khujand • fly to Dushanbe

Fly back to Dushanbe and enjoy a **farewell dinner** tonight. Overnight at the hotel after dinner.

Meals: B, D – *Serena Hotel or similar*

Day Eight, Thursday Depart Dushanbe

The trip concludes with transfers to the airport. (**Note:** Travelers departing in the early morning hours will not have the opportunity for breakfast at the hotel this morning.)

Meals: Independent

Important Notes: Is This Trip Right For You?

The accommodations vary from superior tourist-class to more basic guesthouse-style accommodations in rural locations. It is important to keep in mind that the country of Tajikistan may not be up to the standards North American travelers expect. Services are improving; however, you may encounter problems with bureaucratic service, road conditions, plumbing, unpaved sidewalks, uneven surfaces and steps, variety of locally available foods, and availability and quality of public restrooms. You are traveling in some areas that see few travelers, and the infrastructure is not yet fully developed. The accommodations at Lake Iskander Kul are listed as “Tourist Bungalow” but are not freestanding private buildings – the usual configuration is more akin to a ground-level motel, with a line of adjacent private rooms each accessed directly from outdoors.

While this program is designed to be the most comfortable possible for travel in this region, it is rated as **rigorous touring** due to the daily walking involved, the length of some overland rides and the overall shortcomings of the tourism infrastructure. This itinerary features a significant amount of touring on foot. Many streets are of packed dirt, and some attractions are only accessible via steep staircases with tall, uneven steps.



Every effort has been made to make the information in this schedule accurate. However, trip itineraries are always subject to change. We do our best to inform you in advance of any changes, but due to the nature of travel in Tajikistan, this may not always be possible. Only those willing to accept these conditions should consider joining this program.

To reap the full rewards of this adventure, travelers must be able to walk at least a mile a day. Flexibility, a sense of humor and a willingness to accept local standards of amenities and services are essential components to the enjoyment of this trip.

Weather

Tajikistan's weather varies greatly by region and season, with hot summers and cold winters. The most comfortable times to travel are in spring and fall, in order to catch the best temperatures between the hot parts of summer and the cold winters; however, travel along the Pamir Highway is best done in summer. April-May and October bring average daytime temperatures ranging from 60 to the high 80s, and nighttime ranges between the 40s and 50s. June-September daytime temperatures are typically 75-95+, and it usually stays in the 60s at night. Those whose plans don't allow travel in April-September can still catch great opportunities to visit as early as March, or as late as October-November. At these times, comfortable touring weather is still called for, with warm days and cooler nights.

Please remember, weather at all times of year has an element of the unpredictable. This information comes from weatherbase.com and is based on data from previous temperatures on record. It is always advisable to check with weatherbase.com closer to your departure date for current conditions and forecasts for the specific region of Tajikistan you will be visiting.

International Airfare

MIR's in-house, full-service air department is available to assist with your air travel needs. Check with MIR before booking air on your own, as we are happy to research and compare the best fares available through multiple channels. Airfare varies depending on a wide variety of factors, such as dates of travel and seasonality, seat availability, special airline promotions, how restrictive ticket changes are, how long the fares can be held without purchase, routing considerations such as stopovers, and more. Tour dates are based on the land tour only. Our preferred carrier for this tour is Turkish Airlines, as it offers convenient itineraries and competitive rates from multiple cities across the U.S. to Tajikistan.

Visas

At the time of writing, U.S. passport holders require one visa for this tour: Tajik. You may also need a visa for any additional country you fly via to join the tour.

The Tajik visa is now an e-Visa, which we recommend you process through our preferred provider, Passport Visas Express. You will not need to send your physical passport out to have the visa processed, and in general the Tajik e-visa is issued about a week after application.

An estimate of current visa costs for U.S. passport holders, based on standard processing time, is \$111. Your exact visa fees may differ as visa costs can depend on a number of factors, such as state of residence, processing time, and return shipping. Visa fees are always subject to change.

Please contact us with any questions you may have regarding the timeline for visa processing. In the past some travelers have made their own visa arrangements instead of using MIR's preferred provider for their visa processing; either using their own visas service or attempting to process directly with the embassies/consulates. We strongly recommend you discuss it with us before choosing an alternate visa processing method, to help avoid difficulties and visa problems. **In the event that you plan to process visas without going through MIR's preferred provider, please contact us first so we can pass you detailed instructions with critical trip-specific information.**

Pre-Tour Information

Please note that touring begins on Thursday, Day One, of the Essential Tajikistan program, late morning or after lunch. Because of common flight arrival times into Dushanbe, for your convenience, MIR has pre-booked the hotel from the Wednesday before Day One, with rooms available for check-in after 2:00 p.m. on Wednesday. Many clients will arrive in the very early hours of Thursday morning (1:00-4:00 a.m. or similar). These clients will have access to their rooms on arrival. Clients needing room access before 2:00 p.m. on the Wednesday before Day One will need to have additional night or nights pre-booked at additional expense, which MIR will be happy to assist with.

Essential Central Asia, Uzbekistan and Turkmenistan, 13 days. Explore the markets, mosques and minarets of oasis towns on the fringes of the Kyzyl Kum and Kara Kum deserts. Essential Kazakhstan, 7 days. Begin in the new city of Astana, capital of Kazakhstan only since 1997. Fly to Chimkent and discover the historic city of Turkistan with its UNESCO-listed mausoleum of a revered Sufi sheikh. Fly to Almaty and explore spectacular Charyn Canyon, with its strange rock formations and colorful strata.

Essential Uzbekistan, 10 days. Beginning in the modern capital of Tashkent, roam the great Silk Road oases of Bukhara, Samarkand and Khiva, all of them UNESCO Sites. Admire their mosques, *madrassahs* and minarets clad in ceramic tiles the color of the desert sky.
